## THE BEGINNING OF LA GRAN FAMILIA

In 1998 my husband Glenn Polhemus had no plan to start a children's home in Mexico or anywhere else for that matter. He was part of The Consulta, an organization of priests and laypeople from Texas and Mexico. They met regularly and worshiped together and were there to help the Anglican churches in Mexico. Then one day Glenn got a call from a priest in Mexico. He asked Glenn to come to Mexico and fix his roof. Glenn told him he had no idea of how to fix the church's roof. Week after week he got the same call and gave the same answer. Finally, Glenn went to his priest, Fr. Cliff Gardner, and asked what he should do. Fr. Cliff said, "Fix the roof. Surely

we can get a couple of men that know how to fix it and a bunch of parishioners and youth to help." That was the beginning of many trips into Mexico with the youth and adults of Good Shepherd Episcopal Church in San Angelo.

Then, Glenn got a call from the Bishop of Northern Mexico. He told Glenn that he wanted Glenn to build a church in Cuauhtémoc and one in Chihuahua City. Glenn got in touch with his friend Harold Mueller. Harold was retired from Mueller Steel and was ready and able to build two churches in Mexico. They made many trips to Cuauhtémoc and

with the help of local craftsmen the church was built. At the same time the church was being built, the Bishop of Northern Mexico sent a young American seminarian in Mexico to Cuauhtémoc to start the congregation. The priest lived in a small house and began to grow the congregation in his house. At the same time, he was so distraught with the condition of the children in the neighborhood. They were sick, had terrible skin issues, were street kids, and ate out of dumpsters. By the time the church was completed Fr. Greg had 7 kids he was taking care of. That was when Glenn recognized that an orphanage was part of the ministry. He located a two-story house, purchased it, and La Gran Familia was born. "For I know the plans I have for you..."

August 5, 1999, from the diary of Fr. Greg, founder of La Gran Familia.... "The kids are settling in. Arcilio, the 8-year-old, is such a delight. I forgot to say grace last night and he said, "Padre, let me pray. It will save your memory." He prayed the most beautiful prayer. First, he thanked God for the rain (we were in a thunderstorm). He then thanked God for a house where he could sleep dry. He then gave thanks for the blankets on his bed where he could sleep warm. He then gave thanks for the food. He then prayed a litany of names of children he knows that are still homeless and hungry, praying that God would help them find their way to my house where they could become part of our family. I was in tears by the time we started to eat..."






Martín has conveyed that the entire staff of La Gran Familia have received one dose of the Covid vaccine and are a waiting their second dose. The children all remain healthy at this time.

As thoughts drift to school reopening, we appreciate your help with tuition, uniforms, backpacks and shoes.




Brotherly love.
